There will be a sign-up sheet at the November meeting.



47 students took the Theory exams on Saturday, 35 of whom scored 90 or above! There was one 101, one 100.5, and one 100! The average score for the day was 93.3!

MONSTER CONCERT THANK YOU BRUNCH

Barb Huebner and Janet Dickerson (co-chairs of the Monster Concert in February) hosted a thank you brunch for everyone who helped to make the Monster Concert 2016 a complete success! The brunch was held at the Trailside Event Center on the second floor of Trefzger's Bakery. Jeff Huebner talked to us about the history of the building and the time-line of the reconstruction of the new bakery. There were 11 present, and it was a fun time to reminisce about the concert and just visit. Thank you all for coming, and we missed those that could not attend.

A note from the editor:

The Bradley Spooktacular Concert was seriously, sonorously, spookily spectacular! It was such great fun! The players were all in costume and their performances were superb. I invited two of my high school aged piano students and their mothers to attend, and we thoroughly enjoyed ourselves. After the concert I overheard one of my students say to the other "When we come next year, let's dress in costume." They absolutely loved it!

The concert began in almost total darkness. We had barely enough light to see Dr. Chee Hyeon Choi float onto the stage wearing an elegant pale pink traditional Korean gown (which she was married in!) She daintily seated herself and began to perform "A Haunted House" by Edward McDowell... with the help of a headlight on a headband! It was genius! Then the lights came up and she played Edward Harris' "Chopin in the Citrus Belt: Nocturne for Left Hand and Orange," using an actual orange (yes - a piece of fruit) in her right hand - sometimes playing a single treble "ting," and at other times rolling the orange in a glissando over the black keys. It was lovely, hilarious, and so completely entertaining. What a fantastic opening!



The versatile and always entertaining Dr. John Orfe followed, performing "The Headless Horseman" by Edgar Kelley, costumed *as* The Headless Horseman - wearing a jack-o'-lantern which completely covered his head. How on earth could he see to play?! It was an amazing performance.

Next, Marcia Henry Liebenow and Dr. Choi literally glided onstage costumed as ghosts, Dr. Choi wearing a black face mask with huge black feathers, and Ms. Liebenow wearing a lighted mohawk-like headdress. They played the "Graceful Ghost Rag: Concert Variation for Violin and Piano" by William Bolcom. It was hauntingly beautiful.

Our next treat was "The Night Dance" from Lilith by William Bolcom, performed by saxophonist Matthew Zahner, dressed in red and wearing a dashing black cape, and pianist Dr. John Orfe, all in black with a glittering cat's ears headband! It's such a bizarre and interesting piece, with at times an almost raucous play between the sax and piano - very cool. My students were delightedly surprised to see Dr. Orfe stand up to pluck one of the piano strings.

Libby Larsen. They rocked!

The Hilltop String Quartet's two violinists were dressed as Tin Man and Cowardly Lion, the violist as Scarecrow, and the cellist (the only male of the group, dressed in a blue and white checkered dress and red tennis shoes) was of course Dorothy, carrying Toto in a basket, too! They played a fantastic rendition of "Night on Bald Mountain" by Modest Mussorgsky. Their encore was, appropriately, "Over the Rainbow, which was loved by all.

Dr. Orfe appeared again, this time wearing a skeleton mask, which again completely enclosed his head - to play the Liszt/Horowitz arrangement of "Dance Macabre" by Camille Saint-Saens. I still can't figure out how on earth he could see, yet play so masterfully. We were entranced!



"St. James Infirmary" by Joe Primrose got all of us tapping our toes and bopping along with Todd Kelly, Director, trumpet; Kaity Paternoga, vocals; Stephen Heinemann, saxophone, clarinet; Carl Anderson, trombone; Andy Greiner, bass; Jeremy Clark, drums; and John Orfe, piano. Wowza!! The Finale was "Defying Gravity" from Wicked by Stephen Schwartz, performed beautifully by Susan Somerville Brown and the stellar jazz combo.

What a wonderful, special evening! I dearly hope there will be another Halloween concert next year, and for many years to come. During my drive home I started thinking that I may have to trade in my car for a van, so that I can bring a truck-load of my students next year!
